

Florida Forestry Facts

- Roughly half of Florida is forested, primarily in North & Central FL. (17.1 million acres total)
- About one-third of that is in long leaf and slash pines.
- Since the 1930s, nearly 6 million acres of forestland have been converted to other uses, primarily due to the state's continuing urbanization.
- Forest Ownership:
 - o 64% Private
 - o 36% Public (local, state and federal governments)
- \$25 billion economic impact from forest industry
- Addition \$500 million impact from recreational forest activities
- 124,000 jobs
- 1800 businesses
- 78 primary wood-using mills
- Over 450 million tree seedlings planted 2010-2015
- Wood pulp is the top forest product export
- In addition to wood products, Florida's working forests provide improved water quality and increased water quantity; natural air filtration; and wildlife habitat, as well as recreational opportunities. Estimated value: \$24.7 billion annually
- More than 5000 forest products touch every part of life:
 - Housing, furniture, lumber, etc.
 - Pharmaceuticals (aspirin, prescription drugs)
 - Food (ice cream, cereal bars, bread, salad dressing, chewing gum)
 - Fashion (cosmetics, rayon, toothpaste and toothbrushes, shampoo, laundry detergent, perfume)
 - Fun (skateboards, football helmets, books, paper, fireworks, sports drinks, crayons, tv and cell phone screens)
